



Halsall St Cuthbert's Sunday School



The Agricultural Year & The Church: **Celebrating Farming – Praying for Farmers**

Christian Scripture bears witness to the creative power and wisdom of God. In communities such as ours that have such a close link with farming and agriculture, it seems natural to observe the church's traditions linked with the agricultural year. It is easy in our modern comfortable lives to become detached from and feel like masters of creation, but anyone who depends on the weather will testify that we can't yet control everything. Ancient society lived close to the land, and it is no surprise that many of our ancient Christian festivals all have agrarian roots. The Christian tradition, has assimilated, but with differing emphases and in different times and places, particular agricultural festivals. Much of this is bound up with the need to provide food to sustain human life, and the accompanying sense of a proper humility before God as source of all things, gratitude for his goodness, and responsibility in stewarding the resources of the earth. Having just enjoyed 'Plough Sunday' I thought I might include this list of notable festivals and see whether we might think about observing them.

Plough Sunday – 1st Sunday After Epiphany – 12th January.

Asking for God's blessing on all our endeavours for the coming year.

Rogationtide – 3 Rogation Days for the 18th – 20th May 3 days before Ascension.

Asking for God's blessing on the land – Beating the Bounds.

Lammastide – 2nd August

Celebrating the 1st fruits of the Harvest

Harvest Festival – 11th October

So What Happens Next?



Dear Friends,

One of my favourite programmes as a young boy was Dad's army. Whenever trouble was just around the corner Corporal Jones would run around in a blind panic proclaiming.

"Don't Panic Mr. Mainwaring!"

On occasion this was accompanied by the Scottish Private James Frazer staring wildly at any onlookers announcing, "we're doomed"!

As I write this many of you are in Cork for Paul's installation in his new parish. I know I'm not saying anything new when I say that at the same time as wishing him well, we are sad to see him go. Paul's departure brings with it unwelcome change. Some of us will be looking to the past, remembering previous incumbents and old ways of doing things, perhaps finding old wounds that haven't healed. Many of you have asked me about what plans the diocese has for our future. So, what can we expect? What happens next?

Of course, none of us can know what the future holds, perhaps the only certainty is that there is only one Paul and so whatever and whoever comes next it will certainly be different. So, we are called to trust.

Trust in God and trust in one another.

I am reminded of one of the great Christian mystics Julian of Norwich. In the earliest surviving book in the English language written by a woman, she reveals how, when considering a hazelnut, she came to trust God. Seeing how small and insignificant the nut was, she wondered why it existed at all. In the nut she saw and came to realise that God made it, God loves it, and God keeps it. From that she came to realise that if our creator God cares so much about a hazelnut, then how much more so are we cared for, loved and kept, leading her to proclaim.

"All shall be well and all manner of things shall be well".

In the short term little is likely to change. All those that lead our worship and manage our churches have met and we have a plan for maintaining our current pattern of worship and many have offered assistance in supporting weddings, baptisms and funerals. Of course, losing a full-time incumbent means we will all be asked to contribute a bit more, none more so than our wardens. So please do all you can to help them as much as you can and if you have time and energy, now is the time to offer your services to unburden those who already do a lot.

The process of appointing a new incumbent involves many things, not least our discernment of where God is calling us next. So, pay attention to your prayer life, and your own personal discipleship. I encourage you all to engage with our Bishop's rule of life and stay attentive to where God might be calling us. Listen with your hearts and your heads and with your eyes and ears open, and trust that God will reveal to us his will.

There is preparatory work to be done by the deanery deciding how our churches fit into the deanery plan. We will need to elect parish representatives and prepare a parish profile, all before a post can be advertised. So there is lots of work to be done behind the scenes and it is likely to feel like the process is taking some time. But that time can be useful too if we use it to our advantage.

Waiting gives us time to adjust, it gives us time to listen to each other and discover each other's fears and longings. It gives us time to think about where the spirit is leading us, what we are doing well revealing God's glory to the world and where we could develop more.

This week we enter a week of prayer for Christian unity. Christians across the world will be praying for each other and for the healing of schisms and division within the church. This year the Christian churches of Malta are using the stories of Acts 27 and 28 (when St. Paul was shipwrecked on Malta) to inspire us to *Unusual Kindness*. Some of our discernment process will be easy, some may be difficult. Sometimes we will agree with each other and other times we may not, at all times we are called to *Unusual Kindness*, loving one another as God has loved us.

We have two beautiful thriving, growing parishes. I have no doubt we are known and loved by God and have bright futures ahead of us. Let's proclaim to the world the love of God and work for the coming of his Kingdom.

Offer Lancashire Constabulary a helping hand this winter

Lancashire Constabulary is asking local people to lend officers a helping hand this winter, by taking simple steps to reduce their risk of becoming a victim of crime.

The *Helping Hand* campaign aims to encourage people across the county to do their bit in keeping our county safe, offering a helping hand to the Constabulary and their local communities by following simple, but effective, crime prevention advice.

This winter, to keep its communities safe, the Constabulary is:

- Increasing patrols, creating a visible presence throughout the county
- Hosting additional neighbourhood policing surgeries to offer crime prevention advice and answer any queries or questions
- Working with local businesses across Lancashire to help them reduce their risk of becoming victim to crime at one of the busiest times of the year for retailers
- Giving out crime prevention materials throughout the county, such as purse bells
- Cracking down on drink and drug drivers to increase safety on our roads during the winter months.

You can support the Helping Hand campaign and Lancashire Constabulary by following these 12 tips:

1. Avoid leaving/storing keys where they can be seen or reached through a letter box or window - some criminals use fishing rods and hooks to pick up keys and take them through the letter box.
2. Consider using timer lights or leave a light on in a room and draw the curtains when you go out at night.
3. Before you answer the door, stop and think if you are expecting anyone - not all burglars wear a balaclava.
4. Avoid doorstep sales or offers, such as drainage clearance for cash up front. Bogus traders often offer too good to be true deals to con you

5. Avoid getting stranded on a night out by booking a cab home in advance. Let your friends and family know your plans. Remember to ask for the drivers name and registration number to ensure you get into the right car.

6. Love your mobile? It takes seconds to be snatched, so try to avoid using it unnecessarily in crowded places.

7. Together, we've got security wrapped up - when out and about, look out for yourself and others, remain vigilant and report anything suspicious by ringing the Anti-Terrorist Hotline on 0800 789 321.

8. Ensure that your car is prepared for the colder months - you wouldn't fly without the proper checks being carried out, so why drive without them?

9. There's no safe drink/drug drive limit. Both drink/drug driving costs lives.

10. When buying or selling online, anyone can fall prey to cyber criminals. Always use secure sites - look out for the padlock symbol in the website address bar. It means that all banking details you put into the site at checkout are safe.

11. Be wary of anyone calling saying they are from your bank. Also, avoid clicking on any links in emails that seem to be from your bank. Both phone calls and email are methods fraudsters use to try and gain access to your bank account. If in doubt speak directly to your bank.

12. When defrosting your car, never leave it unattended while your key is in the ignition. It takes just a matter of seconds for you to become a target.

PLANNING

2019/1214/FUL - Dicconsions Farm, Dicconsions Lane - Change of use of existing barn to two dwellings, including demolition of an existing building to the rear and construction of new rear extension

2019/1233/FUL - 69A Renacres Lane - Proposed single storey front extension projecting 1.9m from existing dwelling house and conversion of loft to living accommodation

2019/1240/FUL - Hollybrooks Farm, 1 Moss Road - Proposed change of use of detached garage to a single storey dwelling bungalow with separate access and the construction of a detached garage for the existing house

2019/1257/FUL - 72 New Cut Lane - Erection of 1 No. replacement dwelling (in lieu of No. 72) and 7 No. new dwellings, all with private gardens, in-curtilage car parking and served by a new access road, all following demolition of No. 72 – The Parish Council will be objecting to this application.

PARKING ALONG SUMMERWOOD LANE

Cars parking either side of Summerwood Lane at school times and when funerals and weddings are taking place at St Cuthbert's are causing an obstruction and prevent large vehicles, including the emergency services from passing through.

Please use the Memorial Hall car park whenever possible.

PARKING ON NEW STREET NEAR TO THE JUNCTION WITH CARR MOSS LANE

This is creating a dangerous situation for cars trying to turn out of Carr Moss Lane because their line of sight is obstructed and we would ask that people refrain from parking so close to the junction before a serious accident occurs.

PARKING ON CARR MOSS LANE NEAR TO THE JUNCTION WITH LINEKAR DRIVE

Once again the Parish Council would ask people to use some common sense when parking their cars and not to park so close to the junction as to restrict residents of Linekar Drive from being able to see oncoming cars approaching from both directions when exiting the drive.

PARKING ALONG MOSS ROAD

Cars parking on pavements are causing problems along Moss Road. Can residents please park in their driveways if possible and leave enough room when parking on pavements to allow prams and wheelchairs to get through.

In response to requests from parents, we have decided to trial opening earlier each day at 7-30am. This should help our working parents.

Sessions will cost : £3-50 per day before 7-30am
£2-50 per day after 8-00am



There will be no need to book. Children can just turn up.

If the child is absent there is no fee to pay.

There are no extra journeys for the children along the main road, on cold, frosty and wet and windy mornings.



To keep the children occupied, they'll be able to read, use the computers, play on the iPads, watch TV, play construction games, draw and colour, do their homework and just chill.

There'll also be a free, healthy breakfast available each morning with the option of fruit/cereals/sandwich/milk.

The children will join others in the playground at 8-40pm and will be supervised by staff until the bell.

All profits are re-invested into school to purchase class books and resources, certificates, playtime games, baking ingredients, sports kit, biscuit treats etc.

Kidz Club and Breakfast Club

Breakfast Club : Following requests from parents, the school has agreed to open its morning club from 7-30am and provide a healthy breakfast. To help parents, the club adopts a flexible system whereby children do not need to book in advance, they just turn up. The children have access to computers, they can play on the iPads, do jigsaws, use construction games, draw, read, complete homework etc. There's lots to keep them busy. Fees are £3-50 before 8-00am or £2-50 after 8-00am.

There are also no fees to pay if a child is absent for any reason.

After-School Club : The Kidz Club continues to provide excellent, on-site childcare from 3-30pm until 5-30pm.

Through the spring term 2020, fees are £4, irrespective of the length of stay.

To help parents, the club adopts a flexible system and no fees are payable if a child is absent for any reason.

The children brought in all their unwanted toys in early January for our big TOY SALE. This is always a fabulous occasion for the children. They love searching through all the tables strewn with donated toys to hunt out a bargain. Altogether we raised £175 for Christian Aid. 

A Faculty

A document on display in Halsall choir vestry is a faculty from the 18th century for the purchase and erection of a private pew. This was a time when legalese (The formal language of legal documents) was to the fore and personal property was all important. Owning a pew was like having a piece of 'real estate' and required the expertise of solicitors. St Cuthbert's was under the jurisdiction, at this time, of Chester Diocese and the person overseeing this matter was the Vicar General and principal to Bishop Samuel in the diocese of Chester. His name was Peregrine Gastrell and he was the nephew of Francis Gastrell who was Bishop of Chester in 1714-1725 and one of a long line of Gastrell's who had made a mark in public life.

Peregrine named his son after his uncle Francis. He steered him towards a career in the church and the Rev Francis Gastrell bought and lived in New Place in Stratford upon Avon. This had been William Shakespeare's house and attracted attention from sightseers. Francis became very annoyed by this and in 1756 he destroyed a Mulberry tree which it was reputed Shakespeare had planted. Called to account for this by the authorities, an on going conflict ensued with the people of Stratford. This escalated until in 1759 he demolished the house entirely. This was a severe case of 'cutting one's nose off to spite your face' and would no doubt have given Shakespeare a good laugh as well as material for one of his famous insults.

"I was seeking for a fool when I found you"

"There's no more faith in thee than in a stewed prune"

"You scullion, rampallion, fustillarian!"

You can see the document which Peregrine signed permitting the installation of a pew in the vestry at Halsall Church. Peregrine signed the document with his seal of office in 1738 but by 1748 he was dead. Gardener`s Corner

February at-a-glance.

The first signs of spring are starting to appear if you don't mind going out to look for them! February is a subtle month with catkins and the first bulbs cautiously pushing their heads above the wintery earth, while keen gardeners desperately look for some real gardening to do. Happy gardening.

General Garden Tasks

Make new beds and borders

Finish off winter digging

Order plug plants

Prune certain types of clematis – refer to a good gardening book for exact advice

Renewal – prune old shrubs, deciduous hedges and climbers

Brush snow off conifers, large evergreens and hedges to avoid splaying or breaking

Move deciduous trees and shrubs (ideally do this in November or early March)

Plant lily-of-the-valley crowns

Keep deadheading any winter flowering pansies or polyanthus in tubs and hanging baskets

Water and top-dress plants in year-round tubs and container grown herbs

Prepare soil ready for sowing, covering it with polythene sheeting to warm it up for early vegetables

Plan shallots and Jerusalem artichokes.

Prune autumn-fruiting raspberries now, and plant new canes between now and mid-march

Protect strawberries with horticultural fleece

Finish winter-pruning standard apple and pear trees

Ventilate the greenhouse at every opportunity, but water as little as you can get away with

Pot up stored dahlia tubers and lily bulbs

Spray fuchsias with water on fine days to start them back into growth

Chit potatoes if you didn't get chance last month

Take precautions to make sure your pond never freezes over entirely

Get-a-head

Prepare the greenhouse before the season gets fully underway –clean water storage barrels, watering cans, pots and seed trays, propagator and greenhouse glass.

Plants in their Prime

Hellebores, Hamamelis, Viburnum, Mahonia japonica, Sarcococca, Skimmia japonica `Rubella, Clematis `Freckles`, Jasmine, winter- flowering pansies, Saxifraga apiculata, Daphne mezereum, Abeliophyllum distichum (white forsythia), Sempervivums

Bulbs – Iris reticulata, Crocus, Narcissus (varieties) scilla, Anemone blanda
